Welcome to this special issue of invision, marking 50 years of International Needs ministry. In these pages, we take a look back at some of the blessings and highlights that have shaped IN over the years. But we are not resting on our laurels. 'Forget the former things,' God commands in Isaiah 43:18-19. 'Do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it?'

At the time of writing, delegates from around the IN world are convening in Rotorua on New Zealand's North Island. As well as giving thanks and spending time in prayer and worship, these men and women of God will be carving out time to try to perceive God's 'new thing', his intent for International Needs in the next 50 years.

Future gazing can be problematic, but we trust in an omniscient God. Jesus remarked in Matthew 26:11 that 'the poor you will always have with you'. There will always be a need for us to reach out into communities at home and abroad, to empower families, to build up the church and to improve infrastructure, water supplies, healthcare provision and access to education and vocational training.

The ongoing need for organisations like
International Needs is also supported
by academic research.

With the 2030 implementation deadline of the UN Sustainable Development Goals fast approaching, researchers predict that more than 600 million people will remain in extreme poverty; that there will be an increase in the number of people living in extreme poverty in sub-Saharan Africa and other low-income countries. And a tenth of the population in developing countries will still lack access to clean drinking water (Arief A. Yusuf, Zuzy Anna, Ahmad Komarulzaman, Andy Sumner, October 2023).

Rather than finding this trajectory depressing, we must grasp it as a galvanising force. There are still millions of lives that we can impact for good. Still many men, women and children who we can come alongside and support in their hour of need. Still countless souls that we can win for Christ. It could be as simple as chipping in for our classrooms in Uganda.

We thank God that we do not go it alone, but that we are blessed with supporters like you. Whether you've been with International Needs for the whole 50 years, or just five minutes – thank you. Please stay with us for the long haul. More, Lord.

The first work of IN was with children in Savar, Bangladesh. It all started with just six boys and girls and has since housed, educated and supported thousands of children, many of whom have become leaders in their fields.



Ray Harrison, Founder of International Needs, participated in the 1974 Lausanne Congress on World Evangelization – a significant event in the history of modern evangelicalism. The event, convened by Billy Graham, brought together 2,700 participants from 150 countries. It played a crucial role in shaping IN's vision, and forming the basis of our operations. During the 1970s, Christian missions faced a crisis. Colonialism was rapidly being dismantled, leading to a reevaluation of missions that were closely associated with the former empires.

Missionaries were criticised for being instruments of imperialism – imposing Western interpretations of the Christian faith without giving due consideration to the culture and perspective of the nations where they ministered. In some cases, they were being urged by local Christian

leaders to return home.
Simultaneously, Christianity
was experiencing remarkable
growth in the global South and East,
while declining in the West. Evangelicals
worldwide recognised the need to
adapt, accepting the necessity of serious
contemplation, and, in some cases, the
adoption of new approaches.

The themes that shaped IN at its birth could be summarised as follows:

- 1. Holistic Mission: The Lausanne Covenant articulated a holistic understanding of mission that includes evangelism and social action, emphasising that the two are inseparable parts of the Church's biblical mission.
- **2. Global Collaboration:** Participants underscored the importance of

across denominational and cultural lines to undertake evangelisation effectively.

# 3. Contextualisation of the Gospel:

The congress
highlighted the
need to present
the gospel in
culturally relevant
ways – with
a stress on
understanding
and respecting

varying cultural contexts while communicating clearly Christ's unchanging message.

4. Challenges and Opportunities in Evangelism: With increased awareness of challenge facing evangelism (eg secularism, religious pluralism, political oppression), participants explored new opportunities for mission work.

#### 5. Commitment to Evangelism:

The Lausanne Covenant called for a renewed commitment to evangelism, impelling individuals and churches to prioritise the active sharing of the gospel.

#### 6. Local Christians know best: At

Lausanne, Ray Harrison met with Christian leaders from around the world, valuing their heart for their communities and commitment to the gospel. He concluded that IN would not send people but would support local leaders in their holistic mission.

As we look forward to another halfcentury of International Needs. we thank God for Ray's vision and response to the challenge of his dau. We must consider again how to faithfully respond. Conflict, religious tensions, natural disasters and poverty continue to plague the people of manu nations. There are more people on the move than ever before. There are the challenges of social cohesion. traditional cultures clashing with Western progressive ideals, and – in some areas – increased hostility to the Christian faith. Yet, we are more interconnected than ever, able to respond faster, and can innovate in our work while also harnessing the strengths of traditional ministries.

The world still needs to hear the Good News of Jesus. Are you in?

IN Ghana began under the direction of Rev Walter Pimpong. He had vision to set free women and children still trapped in various forms of slavery. One of the most successful projects was rescuing women from Trokosi slavery. This is a practice of ritual servitude where women are given to priests and fetish shrines as a living sacrifice.



Back in November 2023, Pastor Joshua from Kenya visited the UK and shared his vision for a Leadership and Talent Centre. This centre will be a place to continue his work on the streets of Nairobi, allowing younger people to be resident and removed from the dangers of the slums. During his visit, we were able to connect with so many of you and be encouraged by your prayers and generous giving.

As a result, we were able to smash through our target and raise a massive £44,170

We're very happy to share that the land purchase was finalised at the beginning of April and development is underway! Throughout May the land was enclosed and fenced, marking the boundaries, and protecting against encroachment. This will be particularly useful for the latest stage of development — keeping livestock in and Maasai predators out!

As part of the drive towards sustainability, the team will be rearing livestock (chickens, goats, cows and sheep) on the land to generate an ongoing and reliable income. A container has also been purchased which serves as a tuck shop where the produce of the income generation; meat, dairy produce, honey, vegetables and grains are sold.

# HOW TO MAKE A VOLLEYBALL NET OUT OF WATER

Ingredients

1 International Needs WASH project Several tonnes of peanuts A pinch of community enthusiasm

#### Method

- 1. Work with a community to provide clean drinking water.
- 2. Set up a community water committee to oversee the new infrastructure, train them in water hygiene, maintenance and community liaison.
- 3. Establish small-scale livelhoods programmes by providing an initial supply of peanuts to plant, using the revitalised water supply to help the crops bear fruit.
- 4. Facilitate conversations between community members expressing frustration with anti-social behaviour of young people after school.
- 5. Turn over a small portion of peanut sales profits to purchase a new volleyball net, providing a healthier outlet for teenage energy!

This is exactly what has happened in Nochikulam, Sri Lanka, where we are delighted to report that your donations have now repaired and rehabilitated existing wells and created additional

capacity by building brand new water supplies. The results have been impressive – with the whole community benefiting, and the ramifications going well beyond clean water. The associated peanut growing endeavours have also gone well, with local farmers achieving good harvests.

On receiving reports of disruptive behaviour from some of the village's youngsters in the evenings, the water committee worked with IN and the peanut entrepreneurs to devise a solution. The result: a new volleyball net was purchased with some of the peanut sales income, in order to provide young people with a meaningful activity to participate in.

With the first phase of the Nochikulam project fully implemented, IN is now supporting the community to dig more wells. This water will be used primarily for agriculture, to enable the extension of the peanut-growing enterprise.

Additionally, IN has plans to install tube wells in Monaragala District, in the southeast of the country. This is another rural area with a struggling economy, where IN has been working for several years. A WASH implementation here has been identified as one of the most crucial needs.

IN Ghana, aided by IN UK, headed an extensive and persistent campaign to the Ghanaian government to make the Trokosi practice illegal. Finally, in 1996 the campaign was successful, Trokosi was outlawed and made a punishible crime. IN Ghana continue to work to change mindsets leading to the liberation of over 2,800 women from shrines.

# VOICELESS

Five-year-old Kateryna\* is the youngest of six children. In common with many of the younger Ukrainian children arriving as refugees at the Romanian border, she was also acutely affected by the Russian invasion of her country. This was especially obvious to IN Romania staff who welcomed her to their kindergarten near Sighișoara, specially designed to meet the needs of displaced youngsters. The team observed that Kateryna was traumatised – barely able to speak, or to interact with other children freely. It was clear that she needed specialist support.

IN children's workers referred Kateryna to a speech therapist, and provided an outlet for self-expression through art therapy. With a consistent, compassionate presence, staff are rejoicing that Kateryna has now started to speak again, is playing with other children and is starting to learn the Romanian language to integrate better into her temporary new community.

Meanwhile her five older brothers and sisters also attend the IN-run Joy Kids Centre in Sighişoara. The centre provides activities for refugee children, including art, music, craft, games and additional tutoring in several subjects. Day trips also help the children gain an understanding of Romanian culture.

Kateryna's mother Anichka\* has parented alone for several years, but fights to ensure her children do not lack anything. She took the children to Romania, so that they would be safe, would not feel the burden of war and could flourish. The first words she uttered when she arrived in Sighişoara were: 'I want to work!' I want to work!' Her worn hands are evidence of her hardworking disposition.

Anichka is very grateful because she now has the peace she was searching for. 'We are so thankful for the kindergarten and for the Joy Kids Centre, for all your help. Thank you for taking care of my children and helping them with their education. Thank you for showing so much love towards us.'

IN Uganda began in Kiyindi with a school of 48 sponsored children. The vision was to provide education, particularly for those orphaned by HIV/ Aids. Soon IN Uganda expanded through the district of Buikwe to include several schools, community development programmes and a medical centre.



IN Nepal set up the Lydia Vocational Centre, a 5-month residential programme for young women from rural communities to come to Kathmandu. Here women received training in tailoring and other skills.



Egypt is currently affected by conflict in several of its neighbouring countries, exacerbated by instability in the national economy. More than 9 million refugees are officially registered, from countries such as South Sudan, Eritrea, Yemen and Somalia. The ongoing war in the Gaza Strip is also having an effect on the situation in Egypt.

International Needs is seeking to meet urgent needs as far as possible, with financial assistance provided to refugees and other displaced people, along with bags of food and groceries.

A major focus for IN Egypt is in building up the fragile church in a region where following the Christian faith can be discouraged and even dangerous. Our country leader writes: 'Our Bible School ministry is doing very well. We thank God we have more than 18 young pastors that come to our training centre once a month. Most serve the Lord as a full-time pastor in different villages, which are very difficult places with limited resources.

'The needs in these villages are great. We are very passionate about this ministry, as we

believe that these young pastors are the future... we try as much as possible to give them the best teaching, and to help them in changing others' lives.'

The teaching is also offered via YouTube in order to maximise the benefit.

Sunday School materials are also being produced in order to support the church across the region, with a further three books having just been completed. This curriculum covers children aged 4 to 14, with a culturally-relevant syllabus to attract and engage young people interested in finding out more about the faith.

IN UK began to support IN Egypt in 1997. The founder Nathan's vision was to support the minority Egyptian Christian community as they faced persecution, as well as change the lives and futures of Egypt's young people.

Rev Jean Kone and IN UK partnered to build a school in Bobo Dioulasso. Bobo faced a major shortage of school places for both primary and secondary students due to rapid population growth.

### **LET US SPRAY**

With jihadist violence in much of the country's rural interior still uncontained by the Burkinabe authorities, the number of internally displaced people has now exceeded 2 million according to official sources (UNHCR, February 2024).

Being a relatively safe haven, tens of thousands of villagers have flocked to Burkina Faso's second largest city, Bobo-Dioulasso. This is also the location for IN Burkina Faso's ministries, including a recently expanded school and healthcare centre. Regular supporters will be aware that the team has undertaken much-needed trauma counselling here over the last year or so.



IN Burkina Faso ran its first formal antimalarial programme from October to December 2023. This included distribution of mosquito nets, spraying of the medical centre, school and church, and provision of medicine for malaria and dengue fever. Both conditions are recorded in high numbers in Burkina Faso, and a deadly version of the dengue virus has taken many lives.

The team in Bobo plan to implement a new anti-malarial programme from July 2024, coinciding with the country's wet season through to September, after which the majority of mosquito eggs hatch and the disease tends to reach its annual peak.

IN Burkina Faso is preparing to spray key buildings with insecticidal agents in order to kill the mosquitoes before they can become a hazard. The programme also seeks to provide access via our healthcare centre to anti-malarial drugs as well as vitamins and glucose. These simple interventions. alona

with the distribution of mosquito nets. will quite literally save lives.

IRKINA FASO



IN UK began the Sticks to Bricks project to build permanent school buildings across the Upper Volta region of Ghana. Lessons were taking place in classrooms made of palm leaves and tarpaulins. Teaching was a challenge as classes were easily disrupted and rain meant schools had to shut.

#### Can you you tell us how Ark Quest was founded?

I am a middle child in a family of five and when we were growing up we only had two cows. It was very difficult for my parents to see who to take to school and I remember dad selling one of the cows to take me to school. I prayed to the Lord and asked if, for sure, I'll be able to finish my undergraduate degree and get a job, then I'll be able to transform the life of another child.

Exactly what I prayed is what happened. I graduated as the best in my class, I was employed at my University as a teaching assistant and so I began my academic journey in 2007. So in 2008 I took 8,000 Kenyan shillings and told my mum — 'there are eight children who are needy at the village, I want you to start giving them lunch after their school.'

The numbers proceeded to increase and we realised it was overwhelming, so we had to get someone else. We were around 58 in 2010 and so the numbers kept increasing and increasing. What initially never seemed to become a school was now a school and we were training children right at the Village giving them an education and giving them lunch.

#### How is God working through Ark Quest?

Through the years, it's clear that Ark Quest is God's project. It is not my project or our project. We have seen the Lord really transform the village and us through this project. I have really grown it by faith especially learning to fully trust and depend on the Lord, because our income here is not anywhere close to running that school but God has overwhelmingly supported us through the years since inception. We have had tough days, we've had tough seasons but the amazing fact that God has provided salaries for all our workers to date — it's a mystery!

# GOUARING UP: NEW

Our friends at International Needs Uganda have started the construction of a new classroom block at Makonge Primary School in Kiyindi. **This school serves more than 1,000 pupils** in an area of Uganda where schooling can be inaccessible or completely unaffordable. Kiyindi is a small fishing village on the banks of Lake Victoria, with many families living in poverty. IN has worked in this community since 1994, when the school was first built.

However, some of the existing classroom accommodation now needs to be replaced. The rooms are dark, stifling and airless, with **no ventilation** gaps between walls and roof and only small, shuttered windows. The hot, sweaty atmosphere is not conducive to learning. Cracks are appearing in the walls where **the buildings are subsiding** due to the tiered nature of the site, creating safety concerns. Children are currently having to study and even take exams outside under the shade of a tree (while weather conditions permit) or be squashed into space shared with other classes.

We want to support the dedicated staff at Makonge by providing funds for the new-build educational facilities.

The new and improved 'Block B' will comprise seven classrooms and be able to accommodate 350 children. The solid construction of reinforced concrete will ensure that the building will be resistant to the elements and will last many decades

Each of the seven classrooms will be 210 m² in order to teach up to 50 children at a time. This is a total of 1470 m² – built to last, and adhering to all current regulations.

### CLASSROOMS IN MYND



Participants of recent GoGlobal visits will have seen the early stages of the ceremonial digging of foundations and, more recently, the completion of the groundworks. But there is still much to do.

The headteacher of the school, Augustine Katwaza, took up his post a couple of years ago having previously been deputy head at the nearby Buikwe Primary School. He has a deep understanding of the local community's needs, and has seen firsthand the difference an enriching education can make. Augustine is a man with a big heart and never turns away children who want to come to the school, despite the financial challenges faced.



In total, we are seeking to raise £225,000, an investment in the education of these students which will trickle down to benefit the whole community.



The first borehole of the WASH project was in the process of being sunk in Seruti Village, Buikwe. The water source now gives more than 70 families nearby access to safe water.
























THE RIPPLE EFFECT



So much is happening around the IN world that there's simply not space to include everything. Here are a few shorter snippets...

In **Ghana**, a new playground has been constructed at Kpogede Community School, with a vibrant celebration inaugurating the facility in May. Thank God for this new provision which will benefit the whole community.

Pastor Tayo, a national worker supported by IN **Papua New Guinea**, recently travelled with his wife Janeth more than 300 km on a motorbike to remote Oyana Village to be guest speaker at a four-day Easter service. Consequently, 53 people committed their lives to Jesus, and the couple has been invited back to the community to undertake more evangelistic outreach later in the antipodean winter.

Great news from the IN-supported ZACTS School in **Zambia!** They've just harvested their first batch of 3,497 tilapia from the school's pond, bringing lots of joy and laughter in the process. The fish will not only provide protein for the students' lunches but also contribute to the school finances.



IN Burkina Faso opened **a new maternity unit** in Bobo-Dioulasso, the country's second city.

IN **Nepal** continues to run its successful 'Lydia Ladies' programme, seeking to equip Nepali women with vocational skills to enable them to support their families. Training now takes place both in Kathmandu and in more rural areas, with the first 15 women enrolled in the new, advanced, scheme shortly to complete their course.

Nicador, from Dehradun in neighbouring **India** writes: 'What a joy to see eight

young people decide to follow the Lord Jesus Christ in water baptism. The most wonderful thing for us was to see the young people who have grown in our church since their birth. Most of them we dedicated as a child and now as adults willing to follow the Lord. It is a joy to see that increasingly the local leaders are taking more and more responsibilities in this country.'

Originally trained as a teacher, Revd Justus Miwanda is an Anglican minister co-pastoring St John's Kampala. Justus is married to Deborah, and they have three children. He has also been the Executive Director of International Needs Uganda for over 15 years.

The work of IN Uganda began during the HIV/Aids pandemic in 1994, when International Needs Uganda began a Child Sponsorship programme, providing orphaned children with access to education. IN Uganda now run four schools and provide sponsorship for over 3,000 children.

Since 1994, IN Uganda has also ventured into other ways to combat local poverty through various community development projects, including building Makonge Health Centre, running a five-year HIV/Aids prevention programme, pastor training, a four-year farming project and a Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Project.




#### Marathon Mania

IN Romania continued to provide sanctuary for Ukrainian refugees with the provision of meals, accommodation, aid convoys, access to education and much more.



Trauma counselling continues to be provided to young refugees affected by the violence in Burkina Faso. Moses is such a pillar of faith, that it almost seems impossible that he nearly didn't survive his first few months. Threatened with infanticide on a colossal scale, his mother defied Pharoah's horrific plan. First, she hid her newborn child for three months. Then, she made the difficult decision to send baby Moses floating down the River Nile in a basket, leaving his destiny wholly in the hands of the God she trusted in. Such was her desperation and motherly desire to see her son survive in the face of such horrendous adversitu.

What she could never have known as she set her precious cargo down at the water's edge was that Moses would soon be found by none other than Pharoah's daughter.

Mercy prevailed. Moses flourished.

Fast forward a few thousand years, and conflict, deep-rooted stigma and economic hardship continue to threaten children's lives in many countries. Parents in Burkina Faso unsure how to protect their little ones from the violence of jihadist terrorism. Families in Uganda hiding their babies away in their homes, because they've been born with disabilities regarded in animistic belief systems as a 'curse'. Mums having fled war in Ukraine, finding refuge in a neighbouring country but lacking the language skills or ability to negotiate a new country's red tape in order to secure work.

The reasons are as individual as the children themselves. Children, like Teddy (left) who have hopes, dreams and abilities.

What can we do? Sponsorship is a simple but effective way of stepping up and making a stand. Sponsorship is not adoption - it does not replace parents, rather supports and encourages them too!

£25 each month is enough to see a child through their all-important education. That includes text books, stationery items, uniform, essential medication and often nutritious meals at least once a day. It assures them they are of value. It empowers parents as they continue to provide for their family. Sponsors can expect to receive updates from their sponsored child, as well as school reports charting progress through their education. Many enjoy exchanging letters and sending small gifts for birthdays and Christmas.

You can also sponsor a small group rather than an individual young person, or a community initiative such as a village water project or livelihoods training scheme.
